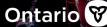

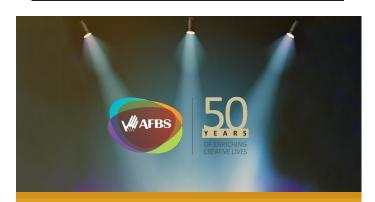

** ARTIST STATEMENT **



CORINNE DUCHESNE "These photographs invite unexpected results. Playing with handmade papier mâché masks, mirrors, movement and random light flares, I tease and coax something to the surface that is rather monstrous. That moment of recogni-

tion, as you pass your own reflection. Time keeps trudging on; we keep adapting."



DARYA GUALTIERI For me, resilience is not about resisting but adapting. With the right mindset, it can turn almost any situation into an opportunity to grow, create, and find meaning. I notice this same strength in nature and art; it reminds me why resil-

ience matters so much in everyday life.



ELAINE WHITTAKER Nature upended? The world's ecology is increasingly fragile and frightening. Climate change remorselessly cultivates the emergence of infectious pathogens. As with

all the earth's species, our resilience has never seemed more precarious and challenged.



ERIN YOUNGMAN The austerity of moment, shapes and architecture, against natural features of sky, snow and fauna, evoke a tension of grit and resilience in theme and lifted emotion. Long walks through South Philadelphia during the COVID

pandemic: Mary defying the midnight snow; Glorious Sky overwhelming lines and homes; vines growing out of an abandoned Ceiling.

** ARTIST STATEMENT **



IMOGEN WHIST In May, I joined a team of doctors in Uzhhorod and Lviv, Ukraine, to document a humanitarian trip. It became a mutual exchange of medical knowledge, shared in universities, hospitals, and over bowls of borscht. Where I anticipated

desolation, I found resilience instead, accompanied by joy, generosity, and the enduring human impulse to connect.



INGER WHIST Regeneratively working an orchard gone no-till; soft mosses,

strong grasses, sweet blossoms, juicy persimmons, stinging nettles, bees. Greatest in resilience are the olive, fig, jujube tree and grape vine. Horrors as water-needy, fruiting trees succumb to the sécheresse, to be later pruned and painted as stark, skeletal statues to hubris.



JACQUI GAJEWSKI Resilience in the face of struggle requires the courage to dig deep and excavate those unseen parts of ourselves not yet fully realized. Prayer and meditation can be a

reservoir of inner strength during hardship; the psyche's archetypal forces unleashed, enduring the alchemical fire of metamorphosis. The soul is released from its suffering and resilience is ultimately rewarded.



JANA ABRAMS

Resilience endures on ancestral land in a hand-built teepee; its weathered poles braced against open sky as a quiet testament to community and belonging. lag's mission centers on Resilience, finding light in

humble forms and honouring how protection and hope are crafted from what we inherit and carry forward.

** ARTIST STATEMENT **



LIN DUPERRON "Symbolism plays a crucial part in my visual storytelling. My work aims to inspire reflection and challenge the narratives that have historically shaped the story of women and the roles they were assigned to play. Women possess

remarkable resilience, especially when silenced."



MARTHA DAVIS "In a world rife with challenges, these three diorama photographs playfully explore resilience in a way that is relatable. Through my body of work known as the "Diorama Dra-

mas", I hope to spark conversation about difficult topics, reduce anxiety and encourage creative problem-solving among people of all ages. To promote this further, I hold diorama-making workshops for both adults and children."



NEGAR POOYA "My self-portraits explore resilience through memory, identity, and the quiet strength of belonging. By layering textures, light, and reflection, I create visual poems that hold

both personal history and emotional truth. Photography, for me, is not about capturing moments but about expressing what remains when words are not enough."



NINA SILVER I am forced to think of the longstanding love shared by my elderly parents when expressing resilience as a source of creative inspiration. My father is 95 and my mother is 93; they have been married for 73 years. Although my mother

now has Alzheimer's disease and my father struggles with his physical abilities, I see so much strength in their endurance when they share moments together.

** ARTIST STATEMENT **



RONNI ROSENBERG Photography animates what is mute. Drawing and painting give voice to personal feelings and ideas; by entangling the two, an opportunity for a conversation between

inner and external worlds is created. This conversation can be a source of strength.



SABRINA LEEDER This work is about connecting the whole community - both indigenous and not, to the stories of MMIW; paying tribute to these women in a dignified and non-exploitive way. This beautiful, meaningful work of art was created to celebrate

the stories, resilience and culture of indigenous peoples across the nation. It is their turn to speak and our turn to listen.



SURYA BADALERA "Before Ruin" is an image that speaks to resilience through a dual lens: the perseverance of nature in an untouched state, and the innocence of a childhood that is yet to be

shaped by the world. Taken in the tranquil outskirts of Dublin, Ireland, this photograph reflects resilience as a quiet endurance - resisting ruin, without the need to harden.



TARA ARNST Resilience, although often associated with ideas of strength, durability and vigour, can also be witnessed in the tension of its opposite. Seen through the feminine principle,

resilience becomes a more subtle and delicate quality. As fragile as these forms appear, the brute force upon which they have pushed themselves up, through the stark earth is a testament to the resilience and the timeless endurance of their beauty.

Trace on My Body directed by Yue Hua. A film about self-acceptance and a conversation with myself. In spring 2023, a physical illness forced

me to re-examine my relationship with my body. Scars, spots, skin, hair, and my unflattering voice, everything that belongs to my body. Shot on 16mm film and scanned digitally. (2024, Animation Experimental, 00:03:30, United States of America).



17H10 directed by Marie Julliard. Introspective, experimental film directed by Marie Julliard. A short film, filled with gentleness and poetry

in the form of superimposed shots, translating the multiplicity of the director's sensibilities and existential questions. (2024, Experimental, 00:06:26, France)



Pomona directed by Julia Dufek. Pomona, a cautious but curious woman, discovers towering Greek statues of Mars, the god of war. Her

initial awe turns to playful subversion, but when her increasingly bold acrobatics take an unexpected turn, Pomona must confront what these ancient symbols truly mean to her identity and future. (2024, Animation, 00:05:00, Germany).

Lavinia directed by Sarah Dutton. Inspired by a character from Shakespeare's "Titus Andronichus." Despite undergoing a huge

transformation within the play, Sarah felt that there was a key moment in Lavinia's character arc that was not featured in the text. Determined to depict this missing story beat, Sarah settled on a movement based, short film. (2024, Experimental, 00:03:45, United Kingdom, England)



Childish directed by Emily Munro. An archival exploration of childhood choreography. How does the child through time, resist oppression,

violence and control? The childish imagination breaks out in flights of fantasy, both brief and absorbing. Energy is directed and contained. I'm live as a battery. Who am I to you? (2024, Experimental Documentary, 00:15:00, United Kingdom, Scotland).

exits / **entrances** directed by Yen Lim. I live to leave. I leave to live. Every door is an opportunity or a risk. Are they just symbols

of transition, curiosity, and the constant negotiation between leaving and staying? What lies behind? Why do we constantly seek for more? Of stepping into others' safe spaces and leaving something behind, of human connection and freedom across linguistic barriers and unfamiliar territories. (cont.)

9:30PM CONT. EXPERIMENTAL FILM PROGRAM

On embracing the in-between, on questioning the shift in physical and lyrical perspectives, while also making mistakes along the process, while trusting every move made. A confrontation with both cultural unfamiliarity and personal introspection. An unplanned exploration, a concept of "how not to make a film," produced as part of Apichatpong Creators' Lab 2023 and shot in Yucatán, Mexico. (2024, Documentary Experimental, 00:11:22, Singapore)



In Stock vel vitae directed by Agnès Roux. Between land, sea and sky, I follow the water, an offering in my hands... In this psycho-geograph-

ical movement at the border of the natural world and that of men, I seek to experience, to metaphorically resonate with this adage from the Middle Ages, between threat and protection. In this performed film, I question the significant function of my plastic elements* in this experience of reality. Between the theatrical instinct of the imagination and the animal instinct of adaptation, I strive to find a fair balance between the authentic character of my performance and the simulacrum of my dramaturgical writing. The sound work is based on this same postulate but it also represents the intangible dimension of this experience that the video tool cannot capture.

The film was entirely produced in iPhoneography (images and sound recording) to respond to "on the spot" work, oscillating between sensitive perception and the search for plausibility that the optimized miniaturization of the camera/sound object of smartphones can offer. (2025, Experimental, 00:13:20, Monaco)

LUVOS migrations (Cut 25) directed by Editta Braun. The experimental short film LU-VOS migrations tells of creatures that wander

through a world dominated by humans. It seems to remain open whether there is room for such fragile creatures in these land-scapes, devastated by human civilization. Vision of the future or images from a parallel universe? In breathtaking natural scenes, automated industrial landscapes and deserted ruins, a journey through time and living spaces unfolds. (2025, Experimental, 00:13:39, Austria)



Kraak; op een broze vensterbank, een vogel of de vanzelfsprekendheid directed by Petra van der Schoot. A figure

wearing a diving helmet and swimming fins arrives at a building and gets drawn in, both unwillingly and willingly. Some passersby, sensing something, return to the place and sneak in through the back door. Inside, they are taken by a performance initiated by this strange figure. Both a humourous and serious film in which sound and space are the main characters. (2024, Experimental, Fiction, 00:38:38, Netherlands).

Over several decades in the Canadian film and television industry, Maureen has worked as a story editor, consultant, analyst and educator. Her

produced film credits include Darkest Miriam (Naomi Jaye), Conceiving Clara (Tarique Qayumi & Tajana Prka), Amal (Richie and Shaun Mehta), In Darkness (David Shamoon, directed by Agnieska Holland), Sharp Corner (Jason Burton), and Nurse. Fighter. Boy (by Charles Officer and Ingrid Veninger); with tv credits for the series Moccasin Flats, Random Passage and On My Mind. She was Story Editor Mentor at the Canadian Film Centre for twenty years and has taught Screenwriting for several years at York University and Humber College. Daniela is a screenwriter, story editor, punchup artist, script supervisor and educator. Her online film and writing programs have served over 1,000 students in 30 countries, and over

the past three decades she has taught for numerous film industry organizations including Pacific Screenwriting Program, DGC Ontario, ACTRA, WIFT-T, IATSE 873, Skills Training Manitoba, ScriptFest PEI, WIFT-T and The CFC, and has guest story edited for ReelWorld E20 and The Female Eye Film Festival.

She has earned 15 laurels for her screenplays, including Grand Prize - WE Screenplay Diverse Voices 2021 and Best Screenplay and Best Fresh Voice at Female Eye Film Festival 2019, but is even more thrilled by her alumni accomplishments, most being first-time writers. From getting staffed in writers' rooms to optioning original series to notable production companies, this is an exciting time for new voices and Daniela is especially here to help underrepresented talent access the industry.

In her work on set, she has script supervised major motion pictures (A Simple Favor, Another Simple Favor, My Big Fat Greek Wedding, Shazam!) and TV Series (Suits, Vladimir, Soul Food:The Series) in 10 countries.

A former stand-up comedian and character actress, her talents are varied, but her mission is singular: change the world, one laugh at a time.

REBECCA DIPASQUALE is a television producer, development consultant, and network executive with nearly two decades experience developing and overseeing the production of scripted dramatic and comedic tv series. Her career began with an internship at CHUM

Known for her expertise in all things Sci-Fi and Fantasy, she has shepherded numerous scripted series that have earned critical acclaim, record-breaking ratings and numerous awards. Rebecca now works independently as a highly sought-after producer, development consultant and story editor, and serves as co-president of Robot Monkey Entertainment.



ALLEY TURCOTTE is a graduate of Toronto Film School's screenwriting program, with a Bachelor of Creative Arts from Yorkville University. She is a writer, story editor and accessibility consultant. She has worked with many emerging and established short film directors

and producers, including Reeth Mazumder and Jordan Walker. She also teaches classes in accessibility in content creation to other creatives with disabilities, physical, mental, and other. Her aim is helping new writers tell their stories honestly and authentically, and helping the industry become more accessible and inclusive. Her own writing is usually about monsters, and always about disability, autonomy, and incredible women.

Bio: Kristin Holodak is a genderqueer, asexual writer-director. She likes to defy the expectations imposed by her upstate New York, Norman Rockwell-esque upbringing. After getting an MFA in film directing from Boston University, Kris moved to Milwaukee, Wisconsin and now teaches filmmaking at Marquette University. A storyteller and image-maker since her early days sneaking photos on her dad's film camera, Kris is drawn to narratives highlighting the invisible and overlooked in society. From Enid in the arthouse drama ENID'S WALL to Fiona in the platonic romance ALL OR NONE, her protagonists often depict queer older women navigating their place in the world. Kris's short films have screened at festivals across the US. Her feature directorial debut, DIFFRACTION, is being released by Glass House Distribution later this year.

With a background in communications, public relations and entrepreneurship, Julianne is a creative at heart. When not writing or making art, she is busy raising kids, weightlifting, making a mess in the kitchen, and dreaming of travelling.

Bio: Prior to attending film school, Kaylyn practised criminal law for several years in Alberta, both as a defence lawyer and as a Crown Prosecutor.

Ben & Ronnie by Erin Mick. Feature, Thriller Dark Comedy, Canada. Ben is traveling to his remote mountain cabin when he encounters Ronnie, a chatty, camera-wielding hitchhiker on her way to nowhere in particular. Ben finds Ronnie's demeanor off-putting and she finds his unassuming charm suspicious. Despite this, they seem drawn to each other and agree to travel as a pair from the scorching Canadian prairies into the cool cover of Rocky Mountain forests.
